Blessed Carlo Acutis Youth Camp officials overjoyed as namesake heads toward canonization

(OSV News) — Its mission is to lead young people to a deep relationship with Jesus Christ through his church. And the Blessed Carlo Acutis Youth Camp does just that each summer for young Catholics in West Virginia.

Set deep in the southern region of the state in the small town of Huttonsville amid the breathtaking mountains of Randolph County, the camp has offered generations of children and young people the opportunity to grow closer to Christ while enjoying the summer camp experience. And the last three years of this ministry has been presented to young Catholics reflecting the love of and dedication to the Most Blessed Sacrament that the teenage boy, for whom the camp is named, had in his life.

"It's no coincidence that as we begin preparing for an incredible summer of Catholic camping, that our namesake should formally be on the way to canonization," said Nick Chancey, director of the Office of Youth and Young Adult Discipleship for the Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston.

"Blessed Carlo Acutis loved Jesus in such a unique and beautiful way, most especially in the real presence of the Blessed Sacrament," he said. "It's unique, in part, because he was so young and had very few people around him to support him in his work and in his devotion to the Eucharist."

"I think many of the young people who come to our camp can relate to that, especially in the face of an ever-secularizing world," he told The Catholic Spirit, newspaper of the statewide diocese. "What better way then, than to bring them together in the beautiful mountains of West Virginia, where they can have fun, make lifelong friendships, and come to know our Lord the same deeply intimate way that Blessed Carlo did, in the Eucharist."

Pope Francis will hold a consistory with cardinals in Rome July 1 for the final approval of the canonization of several sainthood candidates, including

Blessed Carlo Acutis, according to the master of papal liturgical ceremonies. The date or dates for the canonizations could be announced during the ceremony.

Activities at Camp Carlo include a high ropes course, a giant swing, swimming, water slide, horseback riding, backpacking, camping, fishing, canoeing, field games and more. At the center is Christ, camp officials said, "and humbling ourselves in front of the true presence of our Lord during





Mass and adoration."

The camp was founded 59 years ago by the late Father Leon Alexander as the Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston's youth camp with the title Camp Tygart. After a few named changes throughout the years, the camp was renamed Blessed Carlo Acutis Youth Camp in 2021 in honor of the first millennial to be beatified. With the new name came a new motto: "Cum Ipso in monte" (With Him on the Mountain), referencing the Transfiguration, according to the Camp Carlo website. It further notes, "A reflection of the Transfiguration, life at Blessed Carlo Acutis Youth Camp draws young people into direct encounter with the divinity of Christ."

Blessed Carlo, being an incredible figure of what young holiness can look like, shows young Catholics that they too can be saints, Chancey said.

"We now have this beautiful modern example," Chancey said. "This 21st-century boy who devoted his whole life, his whole being really to promoting

us, whose primary goal is the evangelization of young people, than Blessed Carlo Acutis. And that love and that devotion that he had for Jesus in the Eucharist —

the Blessed Sacrament in the

Eucharist. What better figure for

had for Jesus in the Eucharist — that's what we're hoping to instill in these young people."

Upon learning of the news that Pope Francis had recognized a second miracle attributed to the intercession of Blessed Carlo Acutis, clearing the way for him to be formally recognized as a saint, Camp Carlo's new director Kara Milinovich was overwhelmed with excitement.

"Having a young person so passionate for their faith and our Eucharistic Lord is wonderful but having them canonized so close to their death is incredible!" she said. "What an example for each of us."

Kara co-directs the camp with her husband, Steve. The ministry of the camp, she said, reflects the life of Blessed Carlo and his love of the Most Blessed Sacrament in many ways.

"At Camp Carlo, we are blessed with busy priests from the diocese coming to (celebrate) daily Mass, hear confessions, and offer adoration and benediction this summer," she said. "Camp Carlo has the Eucharist at the center of camp life. As Catholics we are blessed with Jesus truly present — body, blood, soul, and divinity. And at camp we celebrate and embrace this. Blessed Carlo made Mass and adoration the key part of his day and, at camp, we do too."

The camp is open to high school students and children in grades three to 12. Campers are led by 14 young adults who serve as camp counselors. According to the camp website, all staff members are required to comply with the Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston's Safe Environment protocol. The Safe Environment protocol entails a background check, acknowledgement of the diocese's policy relating to abuse, and completion of awareness training. They also receive a code of conduct for working with and supervising children and are educated regarding the state of West Virginia's 24-hour reporting requirement.

As the camp looks to have a successful summer, Chancey is looking to add a permanent tribute to the camp's namesake. He is currently in talks with a Catholic artist who has provided a rendering of a Blessed Carlo statue, "hopefully soon to be St. Carlo Acutis statue," he said.

As for a possible location, Chancey envisions the statue to stand at the center of the camp's small courtyard, saying, "That really is the heart of the camp."

It's the perfect place to honor a boy who loved Christ so much and was so drawn to the Most Blessed Sacrament and Christ's real presence in the Eucharist.

Father Francis Xavier Kronemeyer

"Father of the Eastern Deanery" helped establish the Church in eastern Louisiana

Fr. Francis Kronemeyer, a German priest, served as pastor of Our Lady of Lourdes in Vidalia from 1923 until his death in 1949.

Born in Uelzen, Germany on June 1, 1888, Francis Kronemeyer studied in Holland and Austria from 1899 to 1912. He was ordained a priest for the Society of the Divine Word in Moedling, Austria on September 29, 1911 and was sent as a missionary to the then German colony in New Guinea in 1912

At the outbreak of the First World War in 1914, he was transferred to the Philippine Islands. By 1918, his health had deteriorated and he was sent to the United States. Unaccustomed to community life and restless in the classroom, Fr. Kronemeyer sought transfer to a missionary diocese and petitioned Bishop Cornelius Van de Ven of Alexandria to receive him. He was incardinated into the Diocese of Alexandria in 1924. At the time of his appointment by Bishop Van de Ven, the parish of Vidalia served two missions, in St. Joseph and Waterproof, LA.

Fr. Kronemeyer took up residence in a small three-room rectory and set to work with the zeal and energy of a true missionary. This remarkable man began, in 1924, to gather in and organize the Catholics in the area of the civil parishes of Concordia, Catahoula, Tensas, Franklin and LaSalle. Many had not seen a priest for many years.

In addition to serving

Vidalia, he opened missions in Ferriday, Winnsboro and Harrisonburg. Beginning in Ferriday, Fr. Kronemeyer began offering Mass once a month in a private home with about seven people attending. A plot of land was donated for the erection of a small chapel and by the end of 1924 the first chapel was built.

In 1934, the church in Ferriday was destroyed by a tornado and had to be rebuilt. In 1927 LaSalle Parish was detached from Vidalia and placed under the care of the Cathedral in Alexandria. In 1935 Franklin Parish and the church at

Winnsboro were detached from Vidalia. In 1940 the mission of St. Joseph in St. Joseph, Louisiana was erected as an independent parish by Bishop Desmond and placed under the care of the Josephite Fathers. In all of these places the groundwork had been laid through the efforts of Fr. Kronemever.

He was pastor in Vidalia during the moving of the town in 1939-1940 and supervised the moving of the church and rectory to the present site which was donated by Dr. Magoun. In 1945 Fr. Kronemeyer's health began to fail and he was forced to give up teaching the catechism classes he so loved.

On January 1, 1949, Fr. Kronemyer realized his dream of completing 25 years of service as pastor in Vidalia; a place he had come to identify with completely and for which he had given his life. With that sense of completion, "having finished the work he had been given to do", Fr. Kronemeyer died on the steps of the rectory on February 5, 1949. After the funeral Mass his body was laid to rest in Natchez. Those who remember him recall that he was a shy man with a quiet sense of humor and a heavy German accent that never left him. His record reveals a conscientious

for souls. The parishes he helped establish now form the Eastern



Annual survey gives insight into State of the Permanent Diaconate in the Church

WASHINGTON - The U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops' (USCCB) Committee on Clergy, Consecrated Life, and Vocations has released its annual survey, A Portrait of the Permanent Diaconate in 2023: A Study for the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops. Since 2005, the Center for Applied Research in the Apostolate (CARA) at Georgetown University has conducted this survey which provides important statistics and forecasting trends on the state of the permanent diaconate in the Church in the United States.

Bishop Earl A. Boyea of Lansing, chairman of the USCCB's Committee on Clergy, Consecrated Life, and Vocations expressed his gratitude for the service of permanent deacons in the Church: "An important part of the life of deacons has been their service of the poor or vulnerable by bringing them the love of Christ and guidance. The faithful and tireless witness of deacons is greatly appreciated, and it challenges each of us to strive to serve our neighbor better. I invite the faithful to pray and support deacons in their efforts to spread the Word of God and serve those who are many times the least, the last and the lost."

The survey utilized contact information from the National Association of Diaconate Directors (NADD) and was sent to the Office of the Permanent Diaconate in the Latin and Eastern Rite (arch)dioceses and eparchies. In total, CARA received

responses from 128 of the 185 (arch)dioceses/eparchies whose bishops are members of the USCCB and have an active Office of Deacons, for a 69% response rate.

The estimated number of permanent deacons in active ministry was 13,718 in 2023, roughly 69% of all permanent deacons in the Latin Church.

The Archdiocese of Chicago had the greatest number of permanent deacons (827) followed by Galveston-Houston (346), New York (357), and Joliet in Illinois (307).

There were 587 men ordained to the permanent diaconate in 2023. Since 2014, the estimated number of ordinations averaged 613.

Most active deacons are between 60-69 years old (42%) followed by deacons 70 and older (36%).

Most permanent deacons are Caucasian/white (73%) followed by Hispanic/Latino (20%), Asian/Pacific Islander (3%), African American/black (3%), and Native American/other (1%).

Active permanent deacons most commonly serve in a parish ministerial position, such as a DRE or youth minister (23%), followed by a parish non-ministerial position, such as administration or business (20%), diocesan non-ministerial positions (12%). Additionally, 9% were entrusted with the pastoral care of one or more parishes, 8% serve in prison ministry and hospital ministry.

The Diocese of Alexandria participated in this survey. We have 30 active deacons with 14 deacon aspirants in formation.

Diocese of Alexandria participants join National Eucharistic Pilgrimage

The National Eucharistic Congress happening July 17-21 at Lucas Oil Stadium in Indianapolis is ready to welcome thousands of pilgrims to the 10th Annual Congress. However, before this powerful weekend of transformation occurs, a historic journey of the Blessed Sacrament is taking place.

Four Eucharistic processions are crossing the United States leading up to the National Eucharistic Congress. These four routes will travel across 1,000 host cities over a period of 60 days for a total of 6,500 miles traveled. The St. Juan Diego Route, which started at the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception in Brownsville, TX, traversed the state of Louisiana with stops in Dioceses along the I-10 corridor.

On Friday, June 7, Bishop Robert Marshall led a group of 56 pilgrims from the Diocese of Alexandria to New Orleans. The group departed by bus, stopping along the way for a wonderful meal and fellowship at Don's Seafood in Gonzales. After traveling the remainder of the way, the group checked into the hotel to settle in and refresh before departing for Notre Dame Seminary where they joined other pilgrims from across the region for the Eucharistic Procession from the seminary to St. Rita's Catholic Church.

The Eucharistic Procession

started at 6:30 p.m. and was led by Archbishop Gregory Aymond, with Archbishop Hughs and Bishop Marshall in procession. Included in the procession were servers of the Archdiocese, members of the Knights of Columbus, Knights of Peter Claver, The Equestrian Order of the Holy Sepulchre of Jerusalem and other religious organizations. The voices of the faithful rang out as hymns were sung during the procession, the crowd was so large that you could hear the singing echo as it traveled throughout the procession. It was estimated that over 800 people accompanied the Blessed Sacrament to St. Rita's church, where it was overflowing with adorers as people stood both inside and outside. With periods of silent adoration, music, reflection from one of the national pilgrims, the Sacrament of Reconciliation, and Benediction, the time at St. Rita's was one of true Revival in Spirit. One of our local pilgrims described the experience as "Such a great blessing! It was truly special and spiritually uplifting to experience this event in community with fellow believers from our Diocese and beyond. I am so glad I was able to take part."

After the events at St. Rita's, our group gathered back at the hotel for continued fellowship, and reflection of the day's events. There we were treated to a

charcuterie board that covered an entire 6-foot table, with various selection of meats, cheeses, fruits, nuts, and simply too much to mention! The next morning after breakfast, the group departed the hotel for the National Shrine of Our Lady of Prompt Succor on State Street in New Orleans. There we took part in a planned private tour of the Shrine, and listened to the historical roots of the Urseline Sisters and the church, and joined in the Mass celebrated by Bishop Robert Marshall. At the conclusion of mass, a private tour of the museum was offered where relics of the days of old were on display, highlighting the rich history of the Urseline sisters in New Orleans. After the tour, the pilgrims boarded the bus and journeyed back to Alexandria, where the Bishop said a final blessing and our part in the route of the Eucharistic Pilgrimage concluded.

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





CCUSA operates in 50 States, the District of Columbia, and 5 territories offering programs to assist individuals in improving and restoring their lives. CCUSA is the official Domestic Relief Agency of the US Catholic Church that provides support to communities before and after a disaster strikes. In 2022, CCUSA distributed 9 million dollars as one of our nation's major Response Teams. Catholic Charities of Central Louisiana received relief dollars from CCUSA to assist in the long-term relief and recovery support for Central Louisiana following Hurricane Laura. That is just one example of the many ways CCUSA answers the call to assist Catholic Charities of Central Louisiana in helping our community

The ferocity of the Derecho

that hit Houston with wind speeds 75 to 100 mph illustrates the increasing need to prepare for natural disasters and human disasters that may strike our communities. Catholic Charities of Central Louisiana offers a 3-part Disaster Preparedness Program to assist families, parishes, and communities in adapting responses to fit their needs. Part 1 focuses on individuals and families making disaster plans to reduce anxiety, reduce potential damage, and to better protect our households and families. Some of the issues addressed include getting Emergency Warnings, shelter or evacuation plans, and checklist for supplies, emergency papers and even pet needs. Part 2 focuses on securing Parish Operations and protecting the church, so it is available to serve the parish with Mass, sacraments, and parish needs. Part 3 Sharing our Gifts is a call to reach back out to our community with time, talent, and resources during a disaster. Our faith tells us in 1 Peter 4:10 "Each of you should use whatever gift you have received to serve others, as faithful stewards of God's grace in its various forms." Disaster

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

The Newlyweds who became Martyred Saints

In the early days of Christianity, many Catholics suffered for the holy faith. The Roman emperor Diocletian, who ruled from 284 to 305, was an especially brutal executor of the followers of Christ. On one particular day, he had a Catholic young man named Timothy arrested and thrown in jail. He was charged with being "a keeper and copyist of divine books"; that is, Timothy was a reader during special liturgies at Church, and he kept and made copies of sacred texts used for the worship of God. Now, the emperor Diocletian had ordered that all such books were to be confiscated and burned, so soldiers brought Timothy before a pagan governor who demanded that this Christian man hand over the sacred books. Timothy refused to obey this unlawful command, and as a result, he was subjected to horrible tortures: he had white-hot irons shoved in his ears; he was blinded and his eyelids were cut off; he was hung upside-down with a stone around his neck. Indeed, so extreme did his tortures become that even his torturers implored the governor to ease up. And yet Timothy preferred enduring all these tortures to denying Christ.

At about this time, the pagan governor was told by assistants that Timothy had a young wife named Maura, who was married to him just twenty days beforehand. Upon hearing this, the governor immediately demanded that his wife be brought to the scene in order to break the will and spirit of Timothy. If he couldn't tempt him to deny Christ for his own sake, thought the pagan governor Arian, surely he could induce him to give in to apostatizing for Maura's sake. When Maura arrived, Arian appealed to Maura's hopes and dreams to try to persuade her to get Timothy to apostatize. "After all," insisted Arian, "you've only been married for three weeks. Don't you want to live the life you've been promised? Don't you want to raise a family with your husband, to grow old with him? All Timothy has to do is hand over the Scriptures and he will be set free to live in peace

to a happy old age with you." Timothy, however, urged his wife to remain faithful and to not fear the torturers. Faced with this dilemma, Maura boldly declared to her husband, "I am prepared to die with you." She courageously professed that she too was a Christian and would prefer death over a life lived apart from Christ.

Enraged, the pagan governor commanded that her hair be torn from her head, and her fingers cut off. Various other tortures were employed, but all to no avail. Timothy and Maura remained faithful. Finally, the governor ordered that they be crucified upon crosses that faced directly across from each other.

As they hung upon these crosses facing each other, they mutually supported one another by praying together, singing hymns, and encouraging each other as they suffered for Christ. When one was weak, the other would be strong, reminding the beloved of what Jesus suffered for them and of the LORD's promise of everlasting life. After ten days o f incredible fortitude and fidelity to Christ displayed by the two of them, both found themselves welcomed into the

kingdom of God as glorious martyrs. This incredible witness of their courage and abiding joy so inspired their torturer that he soon became a Christian, was later martyred himself, and is now venerated in the Eastern Church as St. Arian of Alexandria!

Though they were married for less than a month, Saints Timothy and Maura displayed an incredible understanding of — and witness to — the purpose of marriage. Far more important than growing old

together with your spouse and having your romantic dreams fulfilled in your relationship, marriage is ultimately meant to be a martyrdom of sacrificial witness to Christ. Spouses ought to challenge and encourage one another to ever more closely follow Christ, enduring both suffering and joy together in doing so, with their ultimate goal being to present their best friend before the Lord as spotless and holy, worthy of sharing in the glorious inheritance of the saints (cf. Eph. 5:26-27).

And so, how stunningly beautiful is the married couple that models this mutual love for Christ and desires their spouse to be united with the Lord more than anything else for them! In other words, how beautiful are spouses who each love God more than they love each other, and hence their love for each other is driven by the ultimate desire to see their spouse united with God! Because Saints Timothy and Maura both had this greater love for God than for each other, and hence they each submitted themselves to the mission of getting each other to heaven, they were able to encourage one another through unimaginable pain and suffering; indeed, their suffering became a cause of rejoicing as they sang hymns together during their crucifixions, for their hope

of seeing the other united with

God was being fulfilled in their becoming glorious martyrs of Jesus Christ.

As Saints Timothy and Maura so wonderfully model, when couples live out the Sacrament of Matrimony in all its beautiful potential, it enables man and woman to make visible the mystery of Christ's faithful and sacrificial love for his Church. Modern married couples, therefore, are called to bear the same witness to this mystery before the world through a life of chastity within marriage (using the gift of their sexuality according to God's designs). Though this is not always easy,

US bishops pass new youth, young adult pastoral framework The first in nearly 30 years

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (OSV News) — Just days after the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops met June 12-14 for their Spring Plenary Assembly in Louisville, the bishops finally achieved the threshold needed to pass their national pastoral framework to guide ministries with youth and young adults.

Despite overwhelming support, the pastoral framework had originally failed by two votes to cross the two-thirds majority threshold needed to pass at the bishops' meeting June 14 after too many individual bishops had already left for their home dioceses by the time the vote was taken that morning.

After canvassing the bishops eligible to vote, 10 more votes in favor had been secured by late June 17, allowing "Listen, Teach, Send: A National Pastoral Framework for Ministries with Youth and Young Adults" to finally pass, according to a June 18 USCCB news release.

As of the close of June 17, the vote on "Listen, Teach, Send" was 188 in favor, four against and four abstentions.

Bishop Robert E. Barron of Winona-Rochester, Minnesota, chair of the bishops' Committee

on Laity, Marriage, Family Life and Youth, presented the pastoral framework that will aid pastors, ministry leaders and families. During his June 13 presentation, the bishop said his committee had engaged in "concerted listening" with youth and young adults, pastoral ministers, families and bishops.

"What we heard was a strong desire to develop a framework that was streamlined and straightforward — one that could be used not just by pastors and pastoral ministers, but also by families and by young people themselves who can evangelize and guide their peers to Christ," said Bishop Barron. "We heard a desire to name and address issues including sexuality, mental health, disaffiliation, racial justice, polarization and the desire of so many young people to transform our society.'

Bishop Barron went on to share with the bishops, "Most importantly, we heard that we cannot be silent or inactive when it comes to the engagement and accompaniment of youth and young adults."

He said the committee's hope is that the framework — modeled on the story of the disciples' encounter with Jesus on the road to Emmaus found in

Luke's Gospel — will offer "new life" to youth ministers.

Bishop Barron said to the bishops that the 1993 World Youth Day gathering in Denver and the release of two national frameworks on youth and young adults around 30 years ago constituted the "last major moment for our church's work with these age groups. Since then, frankly, enthusiasm has waned while disaffiliation has risen."

The committee hopes that "Listen, Teach, Send" together with Pope Francis' encouragement in the 2018 Synod on Young People and his 2019 post-synodal apostolic exhortation "Christus Vivit" can produce "another watershed moment," Bishop Barron said. The framework also includes a letter to young people from the bishops imitating Pope Francis' letter in "Christus Vivit" with a summons to "missionary discipleship and Christ-like leadership."

Bishop Barron described the new framework as "a summons to the church to renew her engagement with youth and young adults" imitating Jesus on the journey to Emmaus.

Like Jesus in the Gospel story, "We are called deeply to listen to the realities facing young people ... to teach in a new way ... and finally, to send youth and young adults forth," as they follow God's call in their mission to transform the world, he said.

Michal Horace, who leads the Archdiocese of Louisville's Office of Youth and Young Adults, told The Record, the archdiocesan newspaper, that his office is "excited" about this new framework.

"It'll invigorate the field and remind folks that everyone is a youth minister," he said in an interview prior to the framework's passage. "The best thing is it takes what we learned — from the synod on youth, the fruit of 'Christus Vivit,' V Encuentro — and brings it all together."

Horace said the story of the road to Emmaus has long been his model for doing youth ministry. He was pleased to see that the national framework is modeled on the Gospel story as well, he said

"Jesus was such a great model. He listened first to figure out their situation and what they needed," he said. "It's a great model for all of us."

According to the USCCB, the promulgation of "Listen, Teach, Send" comes on the fifth anniversary of Pope Francis' message to young people in "Christus Vivit."

In a June 18 statement, Bishop Barron said the Emmaus story provided the inspiration and guide to the development of the pastoral framework and was a story Pope Francis also frequently emphasized as a model for ministry.

"Jesus gave us a wonderful example of how to accompany youth and young adults on their paths of life through the experience of the disciples on the road to Emmaus," Bishop Barron said.

"Like the Lord on the road

to Emmaus, we first listen to the stories, joys, and concerns of those we encounter along the way. We respond with dynamic, kerygmatic (effectively sharing the core message of Jesus Christ), and heartfelt teaching that shares the light of Christ and seeks to bring about a conversion of heart," he said. "And finally, we set the conditions in our ministries and families to send the young forth to follow God's call for their lives, so that they might transform the world with love."

Prior to "Listen, Teach, Send," the U.S. bishops pastorally addressed youth, young adult, and college young adult ministries in "A Vision for Youth Ministry" (1976); "Empowered by the Spirit" (1985); "Sons and Daughters of the Light" (1996); and "Renewing the Vision" (1997).

The bishops' 2023 national plan for Hispanic/Latino ministry "Missionary Disciples Going Forth with Joy" also addressed Hispanic/Latino youth and young adult ministries.
